Inclusion and Empowerment: Heeyeon Son's YMCA Journey

Heeyeon Son's connection with the YMCA is a testament to the profound impact this community has had on her life and family.

Nine years ago, Heeyeon, her husband Matthew Jones, and their daughters, Allison Mina Jones, and Kailee Yena Jones, arrived in Nova Scotia from South Korea. Amidst the challenges of settling into a new country, the YMCA emerged as a beacon of familiarity and support.

"The YMCA provided a sense of belonging when I felt a little lost" Says Heeyeon. "I knew the YMCA because those four letters are known all over the world. I knew I could go and find community."

As a former educator in Korea, Heeyeon brought her passion for learning and teaching to her role at the YMCA. Programs like YReach and HIPPY (Home Instruction for Parents of Pre-school Youngsters) allowed Heeyeon to find avenues to make a difference in the lives of others while fostering a sense of inclusion and support.

Through her involvement in HIPPY, Heeyeon found herself at the forefront of an inclusion program for parents, particularly women and newcomers, to take an active role in their children's education journey. "HIPPY empowers women to become leaders within their families and communities," Heeyeon shares. "Helping mothers with the tools, resources, and support they need to help their children, breaks down cultural and language barriers within the community."

As Heeyeon works to support families through HIPPY, her own daughters, Allison and Yena, have also been experiencing their own journey of empowerment within the YMCA community. From swimming and Tae Kwon Do lessons to babysitting courses, the YMCA of Cumberland and the town of Amherst have provided a safe and supportive environment for the girls to explore their interests, build confidence, and develop essential life skills.



Generations of Connection: Mark Wentzell's YMCA Legacy

From watching his mother's lane swims in the YMCA pool, to his grandchildren's first splashes as babies, the YMCA has been a constant beacon throughout Mark Wentzell's family history.

Mark's story begins in the Edmonton, AB YMCA pool at the age of two, where his parents first introduced him to the joys of swimming. Moving to Halifax at the age of five, Mark's connection with the YMCA deepened. It became a second home, a place where friendships were forged, and memories made. Summer camps filled with outdoor adventures and sports became integral parts of Mark's upbringing.

As Mark grew older, so did his involvement with the YMCA. He transitioned from a participant to a mentor, coaching and guiding younger peers through their own YMCA experiences.

For Mark, the YMCA is a community where he has always felt accepted and valued. This sense of belonging inspired him to give back, leading workshops and eventually finding his place in the YMCA Employment Center.

"I am the YMCA's biggest cheerleader", says Mark, with beaming pride. "This place was always a surrounding piece-that big Y followed me everywhere during the most difficult of times."

When talking about his experience at the YMCA, as an employee of eighteen years, Mark reiterates how his director, Rebekah Skeete served as his guiding light, leading him to view the Y as his cornerstone. "It was a cyclical journey" he says, "[The team's] acceptance felt like being welcomed into a family, offering grace and the opportunity to learn without fear of judgment. They uplifted me, helping me become a more complete version of himself—my truest self."

This guiding light is one that Mark has continued to shine onto everyone he works with. "The individuals I work with are no longer defined by homelessness or addiction. It's not about seeking credit; rather, it's about recognizing the profound impact we have on others—our influence extends far beyond ourselves. We provide a service that acknowledges and respects each person's journey. Our approach is without ego; we simply offer help."

In partnership with One North End, Mark is eager to start working with the EDGE Program. In this program, he will be working with youths aged 18-26 who encounter various barriers. The EDGE Program will offer physical & mental wellness support, a safe and inclusive youth drop-in centre, Career Decision Making and Life Skills Training, and more.

"I am focused on addressing a client's needs without making anything feel like a formal setting", says Mark, "I prioritize comfort and organic learning experiences above anything else."

From classes at Peggy's Cove to Interview Skills workshops at Point Pleasant Park, Mark is adamant on providing an array of diverse activities aimed at holistic growth: "One memorable outing was a visit to the SPCA, where we walked dogs and practiced communication skills—a simple yet impactful exercise that instills confidence in our clients."

When asked about how it feels after eighteen years of working at the YMCA, Mark takes a deep breath and shares that he has never set an alarm for work- that it is his clients and their progress that gets him excited for every day. "Witnessing their growth fills me with pride and satisfaction. Knowing that all will be okay and that tomorrow holds promise for them is what drives me home each day."
